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## INTRODUCTION

*Following the practice of prior years,*  
~~At the beginning of~~ the House of Representatives, on March 1, 1948, adopted a resolution (House Resolution 461, 80th Congress) to establish a special committee to exercise surveillance over the campaigns for the nomination and election of candidates for the House of Representatives during the general election of 1948. The resolution, submitted on February 5, 1948, by Representative Ross Rialley, of Oklahoma, provided in part as follows:

Resolved, That a special committee of five members be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives to investigate and report to the House not later than January 3, 1949, with respect to the following matters:

1. The extent and nature of expenditures made by all candidates for the House of Representatives in connection with their campaign for nomination and election to such office.
2. The amounts subscribed, contributed, or expended, and the value of services rendered, and facilities made available (including personal services, use of advertising space, radio time, office space, moving-picture films, and automobile and other transportation facilities) by any individual, individuals, or group of individuals, committee, partnership, corporation, or labor union, to or on behalf of each such candidate in connection with any such campaign or for the purpose of influencing the votes cast or to be cast at any convention or election held in 1948 to which a candidate for the House of Representatives is to be nominated or elected.
3. The use of any other means or influence (including the promise or use of patronage) for the purpose of aiding or influencing the nomination or election of any such candidates.
4. The amounts, if any, raised, contributed, and expended by any individual, individuals, or group of individuals, committee, partnership, corporation, or labor union, including any political committee thereof, in connection with any such election, and the amounts received by any political committee from any corporation, labor union, individual, individuals, or group of individuals, committee, or partnership.
5. The violations, if any, of the following statutes of the United States.

- (a) The Federal Corrupt Practices Act.
- (b) Title 18, sections 61 to 62b, inclusive, United States Code, 1940 edition, relating to pernicious political activities, commonly referred to as the Hatch Act.
- (c) The provisions of section 304, Public Law 101, Eightieth Congress, chapter 120, first session, referred to as the "Labor Management Relations Act, 1947."
- (d) Any statute or legislative Act of the United States, or of the State within which a candidate is seeking nomination or reelection to the House of Representatives, the violation of which Federal or State statute, or statutes, would affect the qualification of a Member of the House of Representatives within the meaning of article I, section 5, of the Constitution of the United States.

6. Such other matters relating to the election of Members of the House of Representatives in 1948, and the campaigns of candidates in connection therewith, as the committee deems to be of public interest, and which in its opinion will aid the House of Representatives in enacting remedial legislation, or in deciding any contests that may be instituted involving the right to a seat in the House of Representatives....

On March 17, 1948, the Speaker of the House appointed Representatives Risley, of Oklahoma (chairman); Frank Fellows, of Maine; Forest A. Harness, of Indiana; Oren Harris, of Arkansas; and John E. Fogarty, of Rhode Island, as members of the Special Committee on Campaign Expenditures, 80th Congress. House Resolution 508, 80th Congress, provided up to \$150,000 for the Committee's expenses. H. Ralph Burton was named general counsel and Kathryn E. Smith clerk. The committee held its first formal meeting on June 4, 1948, discussing, among other things, the scope of the Committee's authority and the conduct of inquiries into charges of violations of the Corrupt Practices Act, the Hatch Act, and any other public or state law the violation of which would affect the qualifications of a candidate for a seat in the House of Representatives.

The committee devoted most of its time to the investigation of individual complaints of illegal or unethical political activities in election campaigns. The results of the investigation of 17 of these complaints, deemed of major importance, were incorporated in the report of the committee (House Report 2469, 80th Congress, 2d session). In addition, the report presented recommendations for strengthening the Federal election laws. Upon the submittal of its report to the House of Representatives on December 30, 1948, the committee completed its duties.

On June 20, 1950, the House of Representatives adopted House Resolution 635, 81st Congress, creating a special committee to watch over the campaigns for the candidates for the House of Representatives during the general election of 1950. House Resolution 635, 81st Congress, submitted on June 8, 1950, by the majority leader, John W. McCormack, of Massachusetts, embodied the same provisions as House Resolution 461, 80th Congress. The Speaker of the House, on June 30, 1950, named Representative Mike Mansfield, of Montana; Frank L. Chelf, of Kentucky; Charles B. Deane, of North Carolina; Frank Fellows, of Maine; and John Jennings, Jr., of Tennessee, as members of the Special Committee to Investigate Campaign Expenditures, 81st Congress. The committee held its first formal meeting on July 1, 1950, when it unanimously elected Representative Mike Mansfield chairman and directed him to procure the funds, and hire the staff, necessary to carry out its functions. To provide for the expenses of the committee, the House of Representatives, on July 19, 1950, adopted House Resolution 690, 81st Congress; which

provided funds not to exceed \$10,000. James H. Rowe, Jr., became the general counsel of the committee, Richard C. O'Hare its assistant general counsel, and Adrienne C. Masterson its clerk.

With the assistance of the Library of Congress, the committee made a study of Federal, State, and foreign statutes regulating elections, to aid it in framing recommendations for improving the regulation of nominations and elections for Federal offices. It was the policy of the committee to investigate particular elections only upon receiving sworn complaints alleging sufficient facts to establish prima facie cases which merited action by the committee. It conducted such investigations in Congressional districts in Indiana, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Tennessee. To provide to the House the information required of the committee under sections 1, 2, and 4 of House Resolution 635, 81st Congress, and to further its study of legislation regulating elections, the committee made a study of expenditures for both primary and election campaigns. In this study the committee extensively used questionnaires in obtaining relevant facts for its record.

The findings of fact, and the recommendations for remedial legislation, which resulted from the studies and investigations of the committee, were embodied in House Report 3252, 81st Congress, 2d session. The submittal of the report to the House of Representatives on January 3, 1951, marked the close of the committee's work.

The records described in this inventory, amounting to approximately 17 cubic feet, are the records of the Special Committee on Campaign Expenditures, 80th Congress, and of the Special Committee to

Investigate Campaign Expenditures, 81st Congress. They are part of Record Group 233, Records of the United States House of Representatives. No person may have access to the records of these committees, or receive information contained therein, without having obtained the permission of the House of Representatives.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CAMPAIGN EXPENDITURES,

This series encompasses memoranda and correspondence of committee and staff members respecting the agenda of the committee, replies to the committee's circular letter sent to the Secretaries of State of the different states requesting "an authentic list of the names and addresses of all candidates who have filed for the 1948 elections," informational materials, surrendered credentials of investigators of the committee, and the printer's copy of the committee's report (House Report 2459, 80th Congress, 2d session), along with prints thereof. QUESTIONNAIRES RELATING TO "POLITICAL ACTIVITIES AND IDENTITIES."  
JUNE 1948-DEC. 1948. 3 ft.

Shortly after the committee had been organized, its staff prepared a list of the names of about 400 organizations which were

engaging in, or were expected to engage in, activities calculated to influence the election or defeat of candidates for the House of Representatives during the general election of 1948. In June 1948, the committee mailed to these organizations a printed questionnaire, with the request that it be executed, attested to before a notary public, and returned within 15 days. The questionnaire sought to elicit information of "two basic categories, namely, political activities and identities." This series comprises, in the main, the executed questionnaires, in some cases accompanied by supplementary documents; also in the series are correspondence of the committee with the recipients of the questionnaires and memoranda of the committee staff dealing with the answers to the questionnaires. RECORDS OF INVESTIGATIONS. MAY 1948-DEC. 1948. 1 ft. 4

From the very beginning the committee received many complaints from members of Congress and from others, of illegal or unethical political activities, especially in primary campaigns. The committee investigated such of these complaints as appeared to have merit; it sent staff members to election districts to obtain first-hand information concerning these complaints from the interview of principals and of witnesses, and from the examination of official documents. The records of this series document these investigative activities. Included in this series are some records resulting from the committee's investigation of the activities of certain organizations. On September 18, 1950, the committee sent to the State and territorial governments a circular letter requesting information on expenditures made by political committees within their respective borders, and also information on their laws governing political contributions.  QUESTIONNAIRES RELATING TO POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES

In carrying out its duties, the committee sent to each candidate in every primary election, and to each nominee for the general election, running for the House of Representatives, a questionnaire calling for two categories of information: (1) the total amount of contributions to the candidate and the total number of his contributors; (2) his total expenditures, together with constituent totals for radio and television expenses, for newspaper and magazine expenses, for billboard and sign expenses, for salaries or expenses of campaign workers, and for contributions by the candidate to campaign committees. This series comprises the executed copies of the questionnaire (with accompanying correspondence) received by the committee. In addition, the committee mailed to the State committees of the major political parties a questionnaire for the disclosure of their contributions to, and expenditures for, the nomination and election of candidates to the House of Representatives. The questionnaire requested information on the total amount of contributions to all candidates for the House of Representatives, on the total amount of contributions to campaign committees or others acting in behalf of candidates, on the total other expenditures for, or on behalf of, candidates for the House of Representatives, to be broken down into the following categories:

gories; expenditures for radio and television time, expenditures for newspaper and magazine advertising, expenditures for billboards and signs, expenditures for salaries or expenses of campaign workers, and expenditures for miscellaneous purposes. In this series are the executed copies of the questionnaire returned by State committees, along with accompanying correspondence. Arranged alphabetically by name of state.

QUESTIONNAIRES RELATING TO POLITICAL CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES OF

The committee also mailed questionnaires to every "individual candidate political committee" reported to it by candidates for the House of Representatives as receiving and expending funds on their behalf for nomination and election. The questionnaire called for information similar to that desired by the special committee from state committees of the major political parties.
